James "Chief" Wilson, a founding member of Retired Educators Foundation of Orange County (REFOC) and former member of OCREA died on December 5, 2018, at the age of 90. He will long be remembered for his leadership as legendary band director for Jones High School and an important contributor to the Central Florida community. He was inducted into the OCPS Hall of Fame in 2015 and honored by the Historical Society of Central Florida with the Donald A. Cheney Award in 2018.

After that, we evolved to Central Florida Educators Federal Credit Union as we grew, which was later shortened to CFE Federal Credit Union when our charter changed. As we continue to grow, educate, and serve our members, I am pleased to announce that our next evolution is coming this spring.

In May 2019, CFE Federal Credit Union will become Addition Financial.

Addition Financial reflects our mission as a credit union on multiple levels. At its simplest level, the word "addition" is a math term that ties into our legacy of teaching and learning. Our new name also reflects our commitment to adding value for our members, enriching their lives, and doing more to serve our community. By changing our name and our charter, we are unlocking new opportunities to provide even better service and additional benefits for more people.
